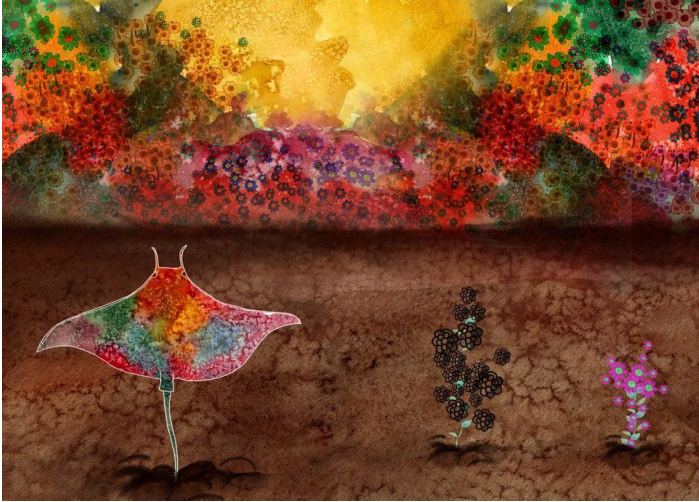














Wondering what to do with wordless stories? Wordless stories are wonderful because they contain infinite possibilities. Here are a few ideas for engaging with children using visual stories: - Explore the story in a leisurely manner. Draw attention to the details - the expressions of the characters, setting, colours, etc. The idea is for each child to

build her own story. If the story is being shown to a group of children, you could ask each of them to contribute a sentence or two for each illustration. Take joy in exploring each illustration and build the story as you go along. - Use themes explored in the story to start a discussion. For instance, in this story, you could talk to them about gardening or even about different kinds of weather (sunny, stormy, rainy, etc). - Encourage children to create 2-3 different stories using the same set of visuals. This will help push their imagination, especially in a story such as this, with elements of fantasy.

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
