Little Cicada loved to sing.



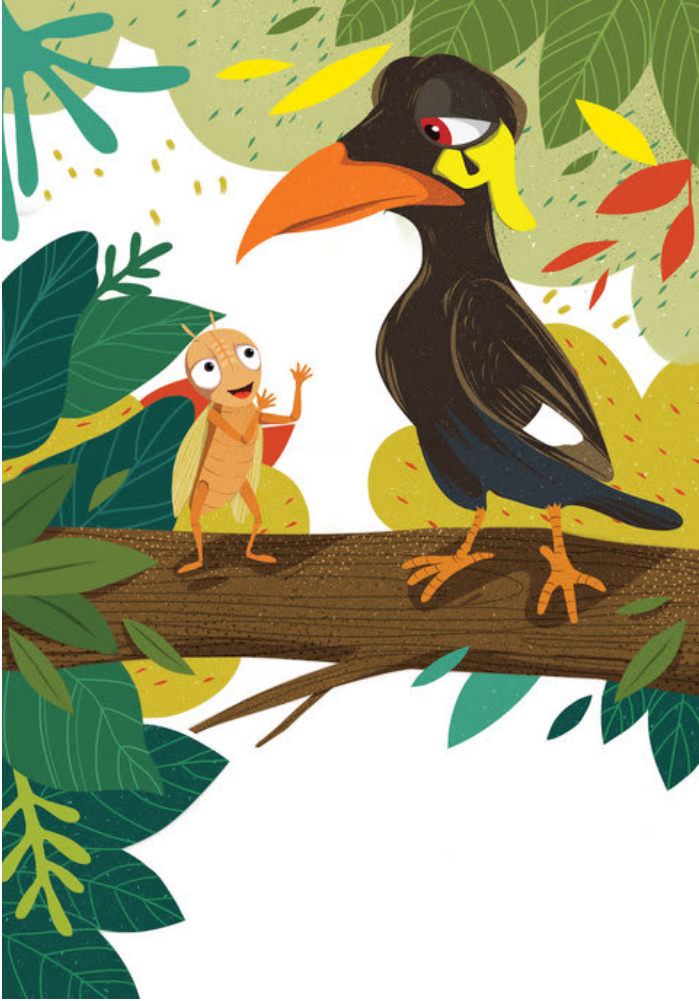
But her song was always the same. She wanted to learn a new song!
